

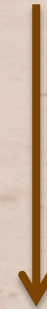
# ClimateScouts in Namibia

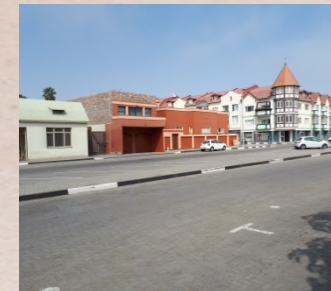

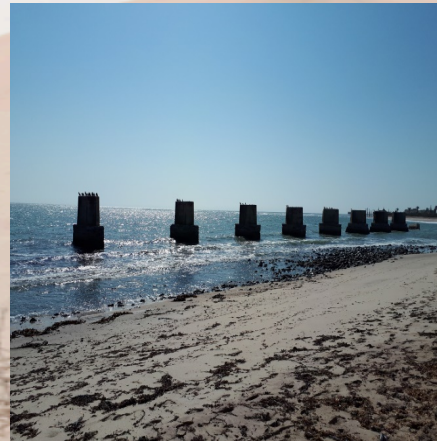
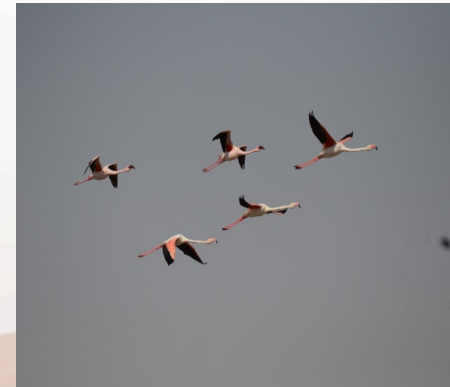

In the afternoon: collecting trash at Swakopmund Bay

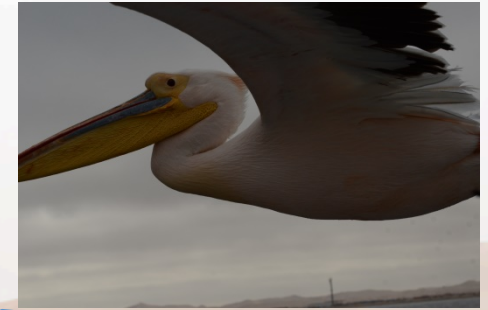

Afternoon: Minigolf and sandboarding with NHS instructors

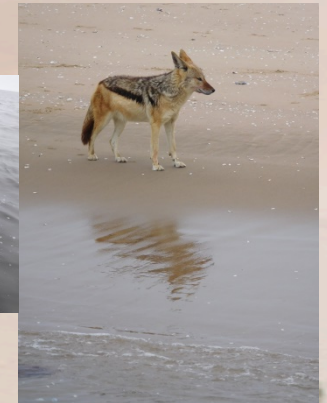

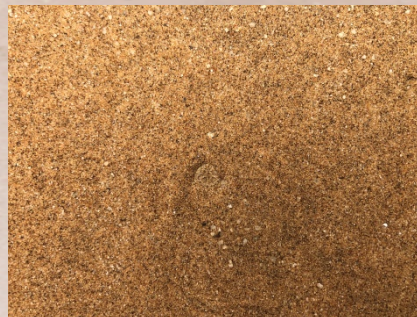
